A STRAIGHT LINE NORTH

LEAN PROFILES AND NATURAL MATERIALS REIGNED AT TORONTO'S INTERIOR DESIGN SHOW AND OFF-SITE, CHAMPIONING A FRESH APPROACH TO NORTHERN TRADITION BY KENDRA JACKSON

FOR MANY YEARS, "CANADIANA" has almost been a word to be avoided in certain circles. During Toronto Design Week in January, a national aesthetic prevailed, although it no longer relied on such clichés as tree-stump stools and live-edge felled log tables. In their place were sleeker silhouettes and pared-back palettes. For the Studio North display at the Interior Design Show, for instance, Jacob Antoni exhibited Latitude, his off-centre wooden pendant with LED components neatly tucked in a round-cornered frame. While a light made of wood has its rustic charm, Latitude's lean profile showed off a much more polished use of the material. The piece won the Best Prototype award. Local small-batch studios, including Lightmaker and furniture artisans Coolican & Company, also made good use of such natural resources as wood and copper, but with refined details that let the materials shine through.

Among other highlights was the Dekton by Cosentino booth, which revelled in crisp white. The square-cut igloo form, designed by Toronto's Cecconi Simone, was made out of the Spanish manufacturer's exclusive, ultra-durable Dekton quartz. Inside, it was an artful mix of geometric patterned panels.

British powerhouse Tom Dixon, another international player on the scene, wowed crowds with his Azure Trade Talk, and his fantasy kitchen collaboration with Caesarstone. Dubbed Ice, it looked a lot like icebergs floating in a sea of black carpeting, a cheeky reference to another cliché of Canadiana, the frozen North. The display premiered one of four kitchens by Dixon, all on view this April at EuroCucina in Milan. AZ

Manufactured at **Blanco**'s Canadian plant, the lkon sink, with its angled apron front, is made from Silgranit, a natural stone composite. The ultra-durable material, in three colours, resists scratches and stains. blancocanada.com

Local design retailer **Mjölk** commissioned Oji Masanori of Japan to design a line of ceramic tableware and two lights, including this brushed brass luminaire with a reading lamp and an upcasting bowl. *mjolk.ca*, *o-ji.jp*
